

As of today, there already had been 107 homicides (almost all caused by gunfire) in KCMO this year, far outpacing the number ever recorded by this date.

I joined Mayor Lucas in requesting the special session, and we both asked the governor to include on its agenda legislation to establish and fund a long overdue pretrial witness protection program in Missouri such as the legislation I co-sponsored during this year's regular session. Fortunately, the governor did include it on the agenda.

The cooperation of witnesses is usually essential to successfully prosecute violent offenders, but witnesses often are reluctant to testify

for fear they would be putting their own safety and the safety of their families at risk. Providing pretrial witness protection will encourage more witnesses to testify which will help take repeat violent offenders off the streets before they can harm more victims.

The Senate is scheduled to convene July 27 to start the session, but won't reconvene until August 5 after the primary election when it will begin its deliberations on legislation. The House is scheduled to have a procedural session on the 27th and to reconvene on August 12.

Under the state constitution, the session could last up to 60 days running through September 25, but it is not expected to last nearly that long.

PARSON CRITICIZED FOR DOWNPLAYING VIRUS' RISK TO KIDS

Governor Mike Parson sparked national criticism and condemnation after stating with certainty on a St. Louis radio program that Missouri children will contract COVID-19 when they return to school, but that "they're going to get over it."

Parson made his comments on July 17 during an interview on KFTK FM during which he discussed the need for public schools to reopen as scheduled next month.

"These kids have to get back to school," Parson said. "They're at the lowest risk possible. And if they do get COVID-19, which they will – and they will when they go to school – they're not going to the hospitals. They're going to go home and they're going to get over it."

Parson's statement quickly spread on social media, with commenters denouncing his seeming ambivalence to children contracting the disease and ignoring the risk they would pose to older family members they might infect, even if the children themselves suffer few ill effects. Major national news organizations also picked up the story.

Parson attempted to walk back his comments during a July 22 interview on KMOX AM in St. Louis, saying: "I didn't do a good job of explaining the point I was trying to make." He also attacked those who criticized him as "sick individuals," according to the St. Louis Post-Dispatch.

Missouri has continued to frequently break daily records for new reported cases. On July 21, the state reported 1,138 new cases – marking the first time it topped the 1,000-case mark in a single day. Missouri shattered that record the next day with 1,301 new cases.

STATE FAIR CANCELLED FOR FIRST TIME SINCE WW II

After planning for weeks to forge ahead with a scaled-back Missouri State Fair, organizers abruptly cancelled most of what was left on July 17 because of safety concerns due to the COVID-19 pandemic. All that will remain at this year's version of the annual event in Sedalia are the outdoor youth livestock shows.

Gov. Mike Parson repeatedly had touted the importance of holding the fair, which he said had previously been cancelled just once during its history, during World War II.

Lack of sponsor support likely contributed to the fair's cancellation, despite the governor's desire to push ahead. The day before organizers made their announcement, the St. Louis Post-Dispatch reported at least 20 major sponsors had pulled out of the event.

This year's fair was scheduled to run from Aug. 13-23. Five of the eight states bordering Missouri had already cancelled their state fairs, according to the Post-Dispatch. Only Arkansas, Kentucky and Nebraska still planned to hold theirs.







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A Warm Welcome for New Gorillas

West Africa will be open to the public beginning Thursday, July 23! Our gorilla troop and other animals will be happy to welcome you back. Please note that face masks will be required



to cross the swinging bridge to enter West Africa, as well as near the Amur leopard habitat. The pathway will also be one-way traffic.

While West Africa has been closed, there's been a lot going on behindthe-scenes with the addition of two new 400-pound male gorillas! After spending their earlier years at the Denver Zoo, brothers Curtis (25) and Charlie (24)

are now a bachelor group of their own in Kansas City. Male gorillas typically live with their family groups until they reach 5-9 years of age. At that time, they may leave to form a family group of their own, live solitary, or create a bachelor group. In zoos, we manage the population of Western lowland gorillas through a consortium called the Species Survival Plan (SSP). Curtis and Charlie will stay at the Kansas City Zoo until the SSP determines if they should make a family of their own here or at another zoo.



Public Improvement Advisory Committee (PIAC) Hearings

PIAC Public Hearings

The Public Improvements Advisory Committee (PIAC), in cooperation with the Mayor and City Council, will be holding public hearings across the city. These hearings are being held so that the Committee and Council can hear from citizens about the city's public improvements needs. The PIAC will use information gathered through the hearings to recommend projects for funding to the Council for Year Thirty- Eight (Fiscal Year 2021-22) of the one-cent sales tax for public improvements

Due to the COVID-19 outbreak, PIAC is modifying the public hearing process to include a remote meeting in each district. Two hearings will be held for each district and will include one virtual meeting and one inperson meeting. The PIAC is making a full effort to ensure that all those who wish to participate in the PIAC district hearings are able to do so in a safe manner. South KC Mobile Food Pantries

With so many people out of work due to the coronavirus pandemic, a growing number of families in south Kansas City are being forced to rely on community food pantries such as Community Assistance Council's to have enough to eat.

Fortunately, Harvesters (the community food network) brings the semitruck that serves as its mobile food pantry to four sites in south Kansas City monthly to distribute fresh produce and other healthy food to families in need. The sites are:

Evangel Church, 1414 E. 103rd St., from 7 to 8:30 a.m. the second Saturday of the month. Persons may remain in their vehicles, and food will be brought to them.

Ruskin High School, 7000 E. 111th St., from 4 to 5:30 p.m. the third Thursday of the month. Vehicles should line up on Ruskin Way on the

east side of the school, and food will be loaded in the vehicles when they reach the school by staff and student volunteers. This event is sponsored by the school and Community Assistance Council.

Colonial Presbyterian Church, 9500 Wornall Rd., with registration beginning at 8 a.m. and food distribution running from about 8:30 to 10 a.m. on the third Saturday of the month. Families are asked to bring two cardboard boxes for volunteers to put the food in.

Martin City K-8 School, 201 E. 133rd St., from 11 a.m. until food runs out on the third Saturday of the month. This event is sponsored by Three Trails Community church.

UNEMPLOYMENT

How to File?

If you're eligible, you'll need the following:

- 1. Your Social Security number;
- 2. Any amount you were paid in the past week, before taxes and deductions;
- 3. The name and mailing address of each job you worked in the past 18 months;
- 4. The dates you started and ended work at each of those jobs.

If this is your first time filing for unemployment please watch <u>this</u> <u>video</u> on unemployment basics. Visit <u>uinteract.labor.mo.gov</u>, create an account and file your claim. If your job loss is related to coronavirus issues, make sure to check a box that says "COVID-19" in your application to waive a requirement to search for a new job amid the crisis.

Missouri provides benefits for up to 20 weeks, which can be extended to 33 weeks under the federal provisions.

The state will pay you up to \$320 per week, and the federal government will provide \$600 on top of whatever you get from the state for each week you're on umployment prior to July 31.

Benefits can be paid within 22 days unless there is an issue with your eligibility, which on average can take 4-6 weeks to resolve.

You should continue filing weekly requests for payment even if you have not yet received benefits.

SUBJECT: Reward Increase – 9 Year Old Dominic Young Homicide

KANSAS CITY, MO --- The Kansas City, Missouri Police Department and the Greater KC Crime Stoppers TIPS Hotline continue to seek information in the January 20, 2018 homicide of 9 year old Dominic Young Jr. at 71 Highway and Emanuel Cleaver II Blvd.

Dominic Young Jr. was apparently hit by a stray gunshot while occupying a vehicle driven by his father and died as a result of his injuries. Dominic, his father and brother were en route to Grandview at the time. The vehicle driven by Dominic's father was hit by gunshots from other vehicles apparently engaged in a gunfight according to statements.

KCPD found a possible crime scene near the intersection where the father said the shooting happened. When the father arrived home in Grandview, Dominic was not responsive. Grandview police initially responded to the father's home and found the boy in critical condition. He was later pronounced dead at a hospital.

A number of community leaders and organizations including State Representative Richard Brown, Mayor Pro Tem Kevin McManus, former City Councilmen Scott Taylor, Scott Wagner, John Sharp; the City of KCMO and Concord Fortress of Hope Church (Pastor Ron Lindsay) have come forward to increase the existing reward in the case up to \$30,000.00. Those leaders are available for comment in regard to the case.
